Green Belt Risk

The June newsletter highlighted radical changes to the planning laws, following publication of the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF). This new policy requires Local Planning Authorities to identify sites for their quota of new housing for at least five years in advance. The NPPF states that planners should "recognise the intrinsic character and beauty of the countryside", however, in a number of further statements the NPPF encourages new development in rural areas. An important feature of current planning law is the opportunity to designate rural land as Green Belt, which provides protection against urban sprawl and uncontrolled development over the fields. Does the NPPF mean we are going to see the end of green belt protection to our precious beautiful countryside? The new planning policy framework, NPPF, means it is clear the Government intend relaxing current regulations so it will be easier to build on green belt land. Of equal concern is the related proposal to allow councils to sell off public amenity land for housing, both for sale or rent. It is also being suggested that farmers will be able to sell their land if is no longer profitable for agricultural use. There is a vital need for more houses to accommodate the growing population but at what cost. Our countryside is a precious asset and future building development needs to be controlled very carefully. Continued on page 2.

Lichen and mosses at Mowsbury Hillfort

The Friends group joined members of the OPAL team and Dr Jon Rosewell from The Open University in the orchard at Mowsbury Hillfort.



Some of the fruit trees were GPS mapped and the task of logging the types of lichens and mosses continued together with recording the quantity of lichens and mosses present. Dr Rosewell demonstrated the use of iSpot, a software package that assists in the identification of lichens and mosses by selecting set descriptions such as colour, height and particular features.

In addition, the Government should encourage more use of 'brown field' sites within existing urban areas eg the new housing on the WH Allen factory site. Bedford had a major building expansion during the Victorian period when the railway and industry arrived in the town, new factories and houses were built. Fortunately, unlike some historic towns and cities, Bedford town centre did not suffer too badly from the rebuilding mania in the 1960s. The town has seen a major residential expansion on the north side of the town with almost continuous house building from the 1960s onwards to establish Brickhill, Putnoe and now Woodlands. Agricultural and horticultural land was lost to these residential estates and the University. However, we should be pleased that Bedford has retained many of its historic buildings and parks, has controlled the residential expansion and integrated new parks and amenity land for public enjoyment and has ensured the countryside continues to be accessible.

There needs to be a balanced approach to future building on the countryside. That is why it is important for the Friends to raise the profile and enhance the recreational usage of Putnoe Wood, Mowsbury Hillfort and the surrounding countryside so that it is totally unacceptable for these areas to be lost to concrete and tarmac.


