60% Cut In Funding

The Borough Council has released its cost cutting proposals for public consultation. If implemented it will mean a 60% reduction in financial support for community led green space projects that do not specifically relate to the Boroughs parks and green spaces. The Friends Group should not be adversely affected by the proposed Modernisation Programme. At this time we will not be making representation at the Public Consultation but we will of course monitor the situation in case further developments impact on our group or the Borough departments with whom we work. We have been assured that everything possible will be done to protect and sustain existing budgets and to maintain the support that we receive from the Priory Park Rangers and the Parks department. You can help to protect healthy oak trees and prevent spreading Acute Oak Decline:

Avoid contact with trees showing symptoms such as stem bleeds and dead or dying branches.

Do not touch the bleeding areas on tree stems.

If you have been walking or cycling in an area where there are diseased trees, clean soles of walking shoes and bicycle tyres before entering areas where trees are not yet affected.

Double Jeopardy

A devastating and little-understood deadly disease is putting Britain's ash trees at risk, the cause is a fungus, *Chalara fraxinea*, which kills the trees. The disease



causes progressive leaf loss and severe die back in an affected tree and eventually kills it completely. The disease has already taken hold in many countries across Europe. It was first discovered in the UK in February of this year in a consignment of saplings sent from a nursery in the Netherlands to a nursery in Buckinghamshire. Scientists have recently confirmed a num-

ber of cases in established woodland in East Anglia, the infected ash trees do not appear to have any association with recently supplied nursery stock. It is now being treated as a quarantine pest under national emergency measures and all suspected cases of the disease must be reported. Spores are thought to be carried on the wind or by animals, although the transmission of the fungus is still not fully understood. There is as yet no known cure or vaccine. With the increase in reported cases of Acute Oak Decline and now the presence of Chalara Ash Dieback, our woodlands, parkland and even the trees in our gardens are under huge threat. Initial precautions are the same as for Acute Oak decline. As many as ten different organisms and diseases are threatening our trees and shrubs including the horse chestnut, the larch and the rhodedendrium. The world trade and import in saplings and plants into this country is thought to be the cause for the significant increase in the diseases attacking our trees and shrubs. Green Space Strategy

As discussed at our last meeting, the Friends Group were asked to participate in the Borough's consultation for the Draft Green Space Strategy. A completed questionnaire with additional comments was submitted on the Friends behalf. One of the comments included asked that the outer hillside meadow, which lies to the west and adjacent to Mowsbury Hillfort, should now be considered an integral part of the Hillfort. The meadow is an important part of the Hillfort's biodiversity and supports a wide diversity of plants and wild life as well as being a recognised and well used recreational area. The outer meadow which we have been working on for the last two years is not included in the draft strategy.

Badgered into remission

The controversial badger cull has been delayed until June 2013. A statement by the Secretary of State for the Department of Environment, Food and Rural Affairs confirmed the postponement of the proposed badger cull, the size of the badger population was partly behind the decision. Approval had been given for a cull in two areas, Gloucestershire and West Somerset, as part of efforts to control bovine tuberculosis (TB) in cattle. Natural England, the environment body, estimated there



were 3,600 badgers in the West Gloucestershire area and 4,300 in West Somerset. The delay will hopefully provide time for reflection on the control of TB.

The results of a nine-year trial suggested the spread of the disease could be slowed if more than 70%

of badgers in a control area were eradicated. The alternative solution of vaccination was considered to be less effective. A disadvantage with vaccinating badgers is unless they are marked or tagged, it will not be possible to distinguish a vaccinated badger from a diseased one. A debate on the badger cull was held in the main chamber of the House of Commons on Thursday 25th October 2012. In a non-binding vote, MPs rejected the policy by 147 votes to 28, calling instead for vaccination, improved testing and bio security. Rights of Way Volunteers

The Borough Council has an obligation to survey each year at least 10% of the Rights of Way (RoW) within the Borough, they normally survey 5% in May and a further 5% in November. In view of the staff cut backs, the Borough is seeking help from Parish Councils and Volunteer groups, like the Friends, to help them with these surveys. A training session was held on Monday 29th October, which was attended by Andy Wilkins and John Wallace. The survey work involves walking along the legally recorded route of a specific RoW, which can be a footpath, bridleway or byway and completing a standard survey form with additional annotations on a map, both provided by the Borough. Each RoW is given an individual number and they can vary in length from 100m to over 1000m. It is interesting to note that FP32 is a RoW which runs in a loop through Putnoe Wood and does not seem to follow the well trodden rides and paths in the Wood.

Following the training, Andy and John agreed to survey a RoW adjacent to Mowsbury Park and another one beside the Wentworth Drive and Church Lane roundabout.

A further training session is planned for Saturday 10th November, please let Andy know if you are interested. Clarification is awaited as to how many places are available for Friends who wish to attend.

with Gin and stand the bottle in a cool place for approximately two months.

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
